April 2 – “The Future of Elections in the USA”

Rebecca Mercuri, Ph.D., Founder, Notable Software, Inc.

How secure are our elections? What could we do to ensure that every vote counts? New initiatives, such as National Popular Vote and Cryptographic Balloting seem to offer promises of security and fairness but may instead obfuscate independent recounting. This talk will help separate the wheat from the chad in determining what America should do to protect the Democratic process.

Dr. Rebecca Mercuri performs digital forensics investigations and provides expert testimony on legal matters. She has been performing research on voting systems since the late 1980's and was requested to opine in Bush v. Gore. Her election technology website www.notablesoftware.com/evote.html continues to be an important resource, worldwide.

April 9 – “UUCMC Green Sanctuary and the LED Project”

The Green Sanctuary Status that was granted to UUCMC a decade ago was but the start of an ongoing process of environmental stewardship. In this talk, we will focus on the strides UUCMC has taken to reduce our operating costs and our carbon footprint through increased efficiency in our electrical system.

April 16 – “Casa Freehold in the Current Anti-immigrant Era”

These are very difficult times for the community of immigrants and refugees that Casa Freehold serves. Our founding roots go back to your meetinghouse, and many of you are already involved in helping our community on some level. I will speak about life is like now for many individuals in the Freehold area and what we can do to help.

Rita Dentino is the Executive Director of Casa Freehold, an immigrant advocacy group. A former social worker with the NJ Department of Family Services, Rita has worked for social justice in many arenas.

April 23 – “From Land to Water: Protecting the Barnegat Bay”

The Barnegat Bay is an ecological treasure and economic powerhouse. Learn about threats to water quality and healthy habitats in the bay and what both residents and visitors can do to protect and restore this nationally significant estuary.

As the Public Outreach Coordinator, Karen manages the communication initiatives and educational programs of the Barnegat Bay Partnership. She has a B.S. degree in Biology from Bucknell University and is a licensed NJ Registered Environmental Health Specialist.

The New York Times reports that the Florida legislature is considering expanding the "**Stand Your Ground**" law to "allow accused killers even greater leeway to claim self defense and immunity from prosecution in violent confrontations." It's not too late to call your Representative to oppose **HR 38** which allows persons who can legally possess guns in an open carry state to carry them into other states that, as well into school zones and federal parks.
