The Board would first like to thank and welcome our newly elected board members: **Rick Goldberg**, VP at Large, and **Ted Wardell**, Treasurer. Volunteer leadership is a gift of time and insight to our community that we appreciate greatly.

A special **thank you** is also in order to Ivan Polonsky and Liz Tortorella for the generous gift of new tables for our Community Room in honor of Liz’s “milestone birthday.” And soon we will all be able to utilize the beautiful new space in the renovated Edgewood House thanks to the generosity of Adeline Arnold’s Estate and Bob Guenther’s organization and hard work. Keep your eyes open for an invitation to our Open House and Dedication as soon as all construction is complete.

Our first Interim **Congregational Meeting** will be on Sunday, October 1, and we look forward to hearing about all the great things scheduled by our Congregational Committees as well as taking a look at the Financial Health of our Congregation.

Our last fiscal year 2016-2017 ended June 30 with an operating surplus! This has been added to the congregation’s retained earnings which now stand at \$52,042. Hats off to our former Treasurer, Tom Smith, and our entire governing body for its fiscal responsibility this past year.

However, as shown in the lower table above, we have a wide gap of more than \$36,000 between our target for pledge funds in FY17-18 and the amount pledged so far. Please affirm your pledges now, if you have not already done so. The Board has approved the budget for FY2017-18, and that wide gap needs to be bridged to maintain fiscal responsibility moving forward.

From the Racial Justice Task Force:

Ann Sherwood is the new co-chair of the task force along with Aimee VanDuyne. Meetings are the second Wednesday of every month at 7pm.

We recognize that all of the issues we are facing as a nation are interconnected. To that end, we are working closely with the Social Justice Committee and the Sanctuary Working Group under the umbrella of Love Resists. In order to let people show their support for all the groups who are disenfranchised and under attack, we are planning on a Love Resists rally on October 29th. These groups include, but are not limited to, LGB, Transgender, Black Lives Matter, Immigrants and refugees, people of color, environmentalists and those caught up in the prison industrial complex. Stay tuned for more information about this rally.

Denominational Affairs

The UUA and UUSC jointly issued a Declaration of Conscience in January. Our congregation signed the Declaration at our spring congregational meeting. The Declaration effort in the UUA/UUSC evolved quickly to a movement called Love Resists, and the concept of "sanctuary" has expanded to now include the many communities across the United States who are under threat today. These communities include: undocumented immigrants, people of color, LGBTQ people and more. From the Love Resists website: "We are called to do what we can to aid and ally with people whose dignity and humanity is under grave threat."

The UUA/UUSC Love Resists team is very actively providing resources such as action guides, webinars, and conference calls to help congregations take up the fight at the local level. The **Sanctuary Working Group** of the UUCMC Racial Justice Task Force has connected with *Casa Freehold* and is now part of a network of like-minded organizations in the state that are fighting for immigrants' rights. The working group currently is planning on accessing or providing training e.g., "Immigration 101" to be better informed, to take action in support of immigrants being targeted for deportation.

In the meantime, members of the working group, to show support and solidarity, accompanied a man (husband, father of 3) from Guatemala to federal court in Newark for hearings before an immigration judge to appeal his deportation status. Other members have visited day workers to give them "know your rights" information. Members have assisted with a youth soccer camp as well as a yard sale at Casa Freehold.

There are many opportunities for volunteering. A side effect of any type of volunteering is getting to know new people whom you would normally not meet. This is essential for growing a new world based on love and acceptance. Watch the weekly eblast for opportunities in this important work.

Investigative reporter Greg Palast, accompanied by a number of well-known actors, presents a dramatic account of the secret purge list of 7.2 million people in the U.S. He leads the effort to track down the funders of this massive disenfranchisement, which may have affected the outcome of the 2016 presidential election. (The film is non-fiction but presented in a film noir- detective style, so may be appealing to younger viewers as well.)
